Attach notes re original prices, explanations or 'WORKS WELL'

- Antiques & collectibles
- Appliances - small & working
- Artwork
- Baby equipment (must meet safety standards)
- Beds* (no large frames) and bedding
- Bikes, scooters
- Boats, kayaks, canoes
- Books** - clean, no textbooks
- Clothing for men, women, kids
Ideally on hangers or folded
- Craft supplies / yarn
- Dishes & glassware
- Furniture. **THINK SMALL*****
Useful apartment pieces such as dressers, end tables, bookcases
- DVDs & CDs & vinyl records
- Games & toys, complete and unbroken
- Gardening supplies
- Handbags, belts, scarves
- Jewelry (may get saved for the Holiday sale where we get better prices)
- Kitchen equipment, any kind
- Lamps
- Linens
- Rugs
- Shoes & boots
- Sports equip. No skis
- Tools - always in demand
